A Report from the Committee of the House of Commons appointed to enquire into the State of the Gaols of this Kingdom, fo far as relates to the cruel Ufage of the Prifoners; which occasioned the following Trials.

R. Ogleborge, from the Committee appointed to inquire into the State of the Gaols of this Kingdom, made a Report of some Progress which the Committee had made in their Inquiry into the State of the Fleet Prison, with the Resolutions of the Committee thereupon; and be read the Report in his Place, and afterwards delivered the same in at the Table, viz.

The Committee find, That the Fleet Prison is an ancient Prison, and formerly used for the Reception of the Prisoners committed by the Council-Table, then called the Court of the Star-Chamber, which exercised unlimited Authority, and inflicted, heavier Punishments than by any Law were warranted.

And as that affumed Authority was found to be an intolerable Burden Annuas that sunfeet Means to introduce on each motorate Britter to the Subject, and the Means to introduce an Arbitrary Power and Government, all Jurisdiction, Power, and Authority belonging unto, or exercised in the fame Court, or by any the Judges, Officers, or Ministers thereof, were clearly and absolutely disloved, taken away, and determined, by an Act made in the fixteenth Year of the Reign of King Charles the First.

And thereby the Committee apprehend all Pretences of the Warden of the Fleet to take Fees from Archbishops, Bishops, Temporal Peers, Baroness, and others of lower Degree, or to put them in Irons, or exact Fees for not doing fo, were determined, and abolished.

That after the laid Act took Place, the Fleet Prilon became a Prilon for Debtors, and for Contempts of the Courts of Chancery, Exchequer, and Common-Pleat only, and sell under the same Regulations as other Gaols of this Kingdom.

That Mr. Huggins being examined touching an Influment figure by him in November 1724, appointing Richard Corbett, one of the five Tipfiaffs of or belonging to the Fleet Prifon, acknowledged that he had no Power by Virtue of any Patent from the Crown to conflitte fach Tipfiaff but that when he came to his Office he found that fach an Officer had been to conflitted, and he took that for a Prescedent to do the form

That fince the faid Thomas Bambridge has acted as Warden, the Books belonging to the Office of the Warden have been very negligantly kept, and the Discharges not duly entered, to the great Prejudice of many of his Majetly's Subjects; and he hath not regelarly taken Charge of the Prisoners committed to his Care by his Patent; and hath not, as he himfelf confelleth, ever had any authentick List of the Prisoners in the Rules delivered him, so he cannot have executed the Trust of keeping his Prisoners in fafe Custody, when he did not know who or where they were.

The Committee find that the said Thomas Bambridge, who for some Years acted as Deputy-Warden of the Fleet, and is now actually Warden of that Prison, hath himself been aiding and affiling in an Escape:
That he caused a private Door to be made through the Walls of the Prison out of the Yard where the Dogs are, the Key of which Door was kept by himself, and he with his own Hands opened the Door and let out #8924, the Smuggler, charged at the King's Suit with upwards of 30,000s. and was afterwards scen at Islington, and hath been several Times let out of the Prison by Bambridge.

The Committee find that the faid Bambridge hath by himfelf and his Agents often refused to admit Pritoners into the Priton, though committed by due Courfe of Law; and in order to extort Money from them, hath often, contrary to an Act of the Twenty-fecond and Twenty-thirdof King Charles II. without their free and voluntary Confert, caused them





Within the UK we usually send everything by second class mail (weight permitting). To Europe, the USA, Canada, and everywhere else in the world we post by Airmail. We never use surface - it's too slow, and we do NOT charge extra for airmail, so please don't worry about it.

Sometimes a very heavy item might need a little extra postage, but that's unusual and we won't ask you easily, so don't worry about it really.
